Chugach members elect two directors

Sisi Cooper and Jim Nordlund were elected to 3-year terms on the Chugach board of directors. Election results were announced at the annual meeting May 17. A total of 14.9 percent of the 66,824 Chugach members of record voted in the election, up from 14.3 percent in 2011.

SPP nears first fire date for gas turbines





The Southcentral Power Project (above left) remains on schedule and on budget, with start-up of the plant's turbines expected to begin in July. The new 183-megawatt power plant will use three gas turbine-generators and one steam turbine-generator operating in combined-cycle mode to efficiently meet the needs of customers. SPP is a joint project between Chugach (70 percent) and Municipal Light & Power (30 percent). The new plant will significantly reduce the amount of natural gas needed to make energy, saving customers of the two utilities an estimated \$20 million or more in avoided fuel purchases in its first full year of operation. SPP is due to be completed and in commercial operation by December 2012. Work on the new International Transmission Substation (above right) adjacent to SPP has largely been completed. The \$21.8 million facility will interconnect SPP to the Railbelt grid.

Chugach base rates change

Base rates for demand and energy for Chugach retail customers rose 1.3 percent, effective May 14. The increase was driven, in part, by distribution storm-related costs (see story below) during the fourth quarter of 2011 and lower retail sales.

The rate change was requested by Chugach in a March 30 filing with the Regulatory Commission of Alaska. The RCA approved the request May 3.

State turns down request for December storm disaster declaration

A request for a state disaster declaration that would have allowed Chugach to recover at least some of the cost of responding to damage from an unusual series of winter storms has been denied. Damage was especially heavy, costly and inconvenient across the northern Kenai Peninsula, leading borough Mayor Mike Navarre to declare a disaster at the local level and request consideration for the same from the state. A state declaration could have enabled Chugach to seek reimbursement for at least a portion of the approximately \$2 million it spent restoring power and repairing lines and structures downed or damaged by high winds, heavy snow and icing.

The denial was contained in a March 28 letter to Mayor Navarre from Major General Thomas Katkus, Commissioner of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. In turning down the request, Gen. Katkus noted that response was within the capability of Chugach, that at the time of the request the situation had been resolved, that only a single utility (Chugach) seemed to have been affected and was therefore not "widespread", and that as a utility Chugach could seek to recover its costs through rates. {800027}

The cost of responding to storms and repairing storm-related damage in the fourth quarter of 2011 was part of the reason for the 1.3 percent increase in retail demand and energy rates that went into effect May 14 (see related article in this Outlet).
