Are you prepared for a power outage?

Fall weather in Southcentral Alaska is anything but predictable. Severe wind storms and early snowfall often result in downed trees, damage to powerlines, and a cluster of outages. One thing we can predict: You won't regret being prepared for a power outage.

Now is a good time to evaluate your family emergency plan. When severe weather is forecast, keep your electronics charged. Experts recommend keeping supplies for five-to-seven days conveniently located. Some items to include in your kit:

- Water
- Non-perishable food
- Extra blankets or sleeping bags
- Pet supplies
- Prescription drugs
- Portable charger/power bank
- Flashlights, matches and a battery-operated radio

People with medical needs or other factors that require uninterrupted power should consider a generator. During outages, keep refrigerators and freezers closed. For more information, go to <u>ready.gov.</u>






Coming soon: Annual member survey
