# Annual meeting and election May 18 – Remember to vote!

Chugach sent the official notice of the annual meeting to members of record in mid-April. This year members will vote to fill two seats on the cooperative's board of directors. {||48223}

This is the first year for a paperless election. Of the 68,826 members of records, 44,182 members had an email on file and received their voting instructions electronically. If you would like to cast your vote electronically, there is still time to add your email address to your account by contacting member services at 563-7366. Member Services can also assist you if your have not yet received your voting email. Paper ballots may also be requested through Chugach's election contractor, BDO, by calling (907) 646-7394.

Election results will be announced at the 2017 Chugach Annual Meeting, to be held at the Dena'ina Center on the evening of Thursday, May 18. Members have until noon on Monday, May 15 to return a paper ballot by mail or

drop box. The deadline for voting electronically is 4:00 p.m. on May 18. In-person voting is allowed at the annual meeting for those who have not yet voted.

Registration opens at 6:00 p.m. and the meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. Hobo |im will be performing starting at 5:30 p.m. until the start of the meeting.

## Chugach cancels Snow River study

Chugach Electric Association has canceled its effort exploring the possibility of a hydroelectric project along the Snow River on the Kenai Peninsula. After a series of meetings with numerous federal, state, non-governmental agencies, and two public meetings, the electric cooperative announced April 20 the Board of Directors accepted a staff recommendation to stop all work on the potential project.

"As a member-owned cooperative that values the opinions of Alaskans and the communities we serve, we have decided to end the Snow River study," said CEO Lee Thibert. "We are committed to sustainable energy, but we've heard from many Alaskans who do not want us to study this option, and we appreciate and respond to those voices and concerns."

In March, Chugach received a permit from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission allowing the utility to study the idea of the hydroelectric project in an area previously identified for its potential. The utility, which is guided by sustainability-a business philosophy of considering the economic, environmental, and social impacts of projectssaid the early public process led to the conclusion that

the project is not consistent with Chugach's strategic goals.

"Our public engagement process worked," said Chugach Board Chair Janet Reiser. "Sustainability is very important to us, and we want to find long-term supplies of energy that will allow Chugach to provide electricity to Alaskans for decades to come. Thank you to our members and other Alaskans who took the time to express their concerns to us."

Chugach is focused on a long-term, carbon reducing, energy supply for Alaska. The utility will continue to look at projects including community solar, opportunities to use more wind, and others.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency only 12.5 percent of e-waste is currently recycled. Sustainable management of electronics avoids toxic substances from being released into the environment and allows the valuable materials, such as gold and copper, to be reused.

Surprisingly, higher Kelvin temperatures (3600-5500 K) are what we consider cool and lower Kelvin temperatures (2700-3000 K) are considered warm.
