To ensure that projects are built at a reasonable price, we are intensifying our emphasis on open and competitive bidding so that all qualified contractors can participate and provide the best value to our member-owners. We have already begun active communication to notify contractors they can pre-qualify to compete for Chugach contracts.

Working to reduce costs also includes working with wholesale customers to benefit both retail and wholesale customers. Chugach board members have attended the monthly meetings of Homer Electric and Matanuska Electric to hear their concerns face-to-face. In fact, Chugach and Matanuska Electric held a joint board meeting, the first in many, many years. Building good relationships will help us all to deal with the generation and infrastructure opportunities that lie ahead.

Cost savings are an uphill battle with fuel costs skyrocketing. Although the base rates have not changed, you can see the aggregate bill going up as Chugach passes through the increased fuel costs. Although we have little control over gas costs, we use our lowest cost generation on a routine basis.

Safety First Back to School Safety Tips

Children walking and biking to school need to be reminded about safety as young pedestrians can face a wide variety of decisions that can create some dangerous situations . Here are a few basic safety tips:

Mind all traffic signals and/or the crossing guard.

Never cross the street against a light, even if you don't see any traffic coming.

Walk your bike through intersections.

 \mathbf{W} alk with a buddy.

Wear reflective materials as it

makes you more visible to street traffic.

In addition, children as well as adults riding in a car should be protected as most traffic crashes occur close to home

Everyone needs to be buckled up properly as you are four times more likely to be seriously injured or killed if ejected from the vehicle in a crash. That means older kids should be using seat belts, younger children should be in booster seats and small kids in child safety seats. Safety belts are the best form of protection passengers have in the event of a crash as they can lower the risk of injury by 45 percent.



October is national cooperative month, and each year co-ops across the nation celebrate the roles, accomplishments and contributions of the nation's cooperatives. What does that mean to you as a member of Chugach Electric's services?

It means that you are not just a consumer or a number; it means you are a member and an owner of Chugach.

When you signed up for electrical service, you paid a \$5 membership fee. In return, you receive the benefits of being a part-owner in your electrical cooperative. That means you can vote in elections, including for members of the board of directors and changes to the bylaws. In addition, you receive a share of margins (or profits as other businesses call them).

Chugach incorporated in March 1948 as a Rural Electrification Administration cooperative and has grown from nine members in November of that year to a membership of 63,398 as of August of this year. The fee to become a member in 1948 was \$5, the same as it is today.
