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Projects bring improvements to electric system

Chugach is busy this summer on a number of projects designed to improve power delivery and reliability to our members.

Partnering with the City on 100th & Spenard Road projects

We are partnering with the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) on some projects, including the 100th Avenue corridor between Minnesota Drive and C Street. The project will complete the connection of 100th to the Old Seward Highway. As part of the project, Chugach is moving our 34.5 kV underground cable—which runs east/ west—to the south to accommodate the road project. Chugach is also putting in a power pole and relocating guy wires on the east side of Minnesota to mitigate conflicts with the planned road extension. Total project cost is \$800,000 which will be reimbursed by the MOA.

Chugach is also working with the MOA on the Spenard Road project. Spenard is being reconstructed from Hillcrest Drive to 30th Avenue with a number of improvements. The Chugach work includes relocating aerial 3-phase distribution lines, putting them underground. The project will replace approximately 875 feet from 31st Avenue to Benson. The upgrade will allow for additional capacity for future load growth. {1187768}

Undergrounding projects move forward

Several undergrounding projects are also planned this summer including DeBarr Road to Muldoon. The project will retire nine distribution poles and wire along DeBarr Road, south of Fred Meyer, and install underground facilities. The Creekside Town Center, Begich Middle School, and Wal-Mart have all added to increased loads in the area, prompting the need for system improvements.

Along Boniface Parkway, 709 feet of line will be put underground north of Northern Lights. The upgrade will improve system capacity for existing and new load growth, as well as improve reliability. The summer peak loading is near the capacity limit of the current circuit, representing one of the heaviest loaded overhead line segments on the system.

New equipment at Daves Creek and Soldotna

Chugach is working with several partners on a project

on the Kenai Peninsula. Chugach is managing the replacement of thyristor valves, cooling pumps, cooling towers and control systems at the Daves

Creek and Soldotna Static VAr Compensators (SVC). The SVCs use large power electronics, very large transistors which are similar to what is in a computer, to control the flow of current through inductors and capacitors, allowing Chugach to increase the amount of power exported off of the Kenai Peninsula.

Improvements at Daves Creek SVC were substantially completed earlier in the year, and commissioning at the Soldotna SVC will run through

August. The SVCs are owned by the State of Alaska through the Bradley Lake Hydro Project, and each of the six Railbelt utilities contribute financially while Chugach operates and maintains the equipment.

Rate changes

Effective July 1, 2017, a number of rate changes are going into effect. The Regulatory Commission of Alaska approved a 3 percent demand and energy rate decrease for Chugach retail members. This reduction, however, is offset by higher fuel and purchased power rates and a slight increase in the Regulatory Cost Charge. For a residential customer using 600 kWh per month, the total bill will increase from \$115.10 to \$117.60, or approximately 2.2 percent.
